

Migrants' Rights at Borders National Report



The Greek National Commission for Human Rights (GNCHR) is the Greek NHRI, accredited with A-status since 2001. This report covers the GNCHR's activities on the protection of migrants' rights at borders in 2020, taking into consideration major developments such as the entry into force of a new legal regime on international protection, tensions occurred at the Greek-Turkish land borders, and the pandemic.

RETURNS AND VIOLENCE

On informal forced returns:



The GNCHR was informed of pushbacks at the Greek-Turkish border and the use of life-threatening methods during operations at sea



Greek authorities dismissed these allegations, no case of pushback has ever resulted in a trial



The GNCHR will soon launch a mechanism for recording incidents of informal forced returns.

SITUATION IN RECEPTION CENTRES

During a visit at the Vathy Reception and Identification Centre and the surrounding makeshift camp, the GNCHR found:



Severe overcrowding and insufficient access to essential services



Lack of control by authorities over a large portion of the informal camp, with frequent security incidents happening



Big gaps in the provision of health and psychological services due to staff and medicine shortages



Unaccompanied children living in unsuitable conditions with no access to formal education.

FAIR AND EFFECTIVE PROCEDURES

The GNCHR noted:



Widespread practice of notifying decisions on asylum applications to third parties, thus hindering the applicant's ability to appeal



Insufficient provision of free legal aid at the appeal stage



Irregularities in the screening of persons belonging to vulnerable groups.

DETENTION CONDITIONS



The GNCHR reported detention pilot programs in Lesvos, Kos and Leros, and asylum seekers being automatically deprived of their liberty upon arrival



NGOs and human rights bodies have called for the release of all migrants detained in asylum and return procedures due to lack of prospect for removal.

HUMAN RIGHTS ACCOUNTABILITY



NGOs working on asylum and migration issues are required to register under strict conditions



There are widespread reports of NGO members facing criminal charges under numerous grounds (espionage, violation of state secrets and the Immigration Code).
